Health and Safety updates

- <u>Control of Major Accident Hazards (COMAH) Regulations 2015</u> came into force on 1 June 2015. They
 apply mainly to the chemical and petrochemical industries, but also affect other businesses which
 store certain quantities of substances with hazardous classifications. Under the new regulations these
 classifications have changed, bringing new businesses into the scope of the directive. Every site of
 a business needs to:
 - determine whether they are in scope of COMAH 2015 and notify or re-notify the Competent Authority by 1 June 2016. Upper tier COMAH sites must prepare a safety report which demonstrates this;
 - o take all necessary measures to prevent major accidents involving dangerous substances; and

 \circ limit the consequences to people and the environment of any major accidents which do occur. Guidance is available - <u>L111 (Third edition - reissued with amendments October 2015)</u>.

- <u>Tougher Guidelines, Higher Fines (2015 / 2016).</u> Tougher guidelines proposed by the Sentencing Council came into force on 1 February 2016. It means that large companies in England and Wales can expect fines of around £10 million for the most serious breaches of health and safety law or £20m in corporate manslaughter cases. The new guideline is intended to ensure a consistent approach to the sentencing of individuals and organisations convicted of health and safety, corporate manslaughter and food safety and hygiene offences by courts in England and Wales.
- New <u>Guidance on the Health and Safety (Safety Signs and Signals) Regulations 1996</u>- <u>L64 (Third</u> <u>edition)</u> was published by HSE on 1 June 2015.
